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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD OF DEPUTIES

This has been a year like no other. The global pandemic has affected life more in a short space of time than any other event in peacetime.

Of course, the effects have been experienced worldwide with hundreds of thousands dead and millions more badly affected by this virulent virus. We are a small community but we have been hit heavily. Sadly, our death rate has been more than double that of the general community and we have lost some wonderful people since March, taken from us way before their time.

It has been a time to mourn but also a time to act. The Board of Deputies lobbied hard to ensure that local councils could not cremate bodies without first consulting with the families of the deceased. This was a fine example of collaboration between Jews and Muslims who shared the same concerns. We collaborated closely with other community organisations to ensure that UK Jews are receiving all the help and information possible in the emergency, using all of our resources for the benefit of those affected. We collated a document bringing together all of the special guidelines for Passover this year and devised a card for members of the community to print off, fill out and post through the letter box to neighbours, letting members of the local community know that people are available to do a food shop or even just to speak to someone on the phone who is self-isolating. No less importantly, our team has had the sad but necessary duty of collating the deaths we have endured so that we have an accurate record.

Last year, we were in the midst of Labour's anti-semitism crisis. Twelve months on and Labour are, in the words of new leader Sir Keir Starmer, "under new management". We set out our Ten Pledges on anti-Jewish racism in January and they were enthusiastically adopted by the new leadership team. The progress we have seen is very encouraging. The scourge of anti-semitism has not disappeared from the Labour Party but the determination to address it and take action where it is needed, as in the case of the sacking of Rebecca Long-Bailey, gives all of us reason to be optimistic after a dark few years.

Even Coronavirus could not completely

overshadow the worldwide movement, which developed rapidly in response to the racist murder of George Floyd. We in the Jewish community felt we needed to formulate our own initiative. The result is the Board of Deputies' Commission on Racial Inclusivity in the Jewish Community, which is being chaired by distinguished journalist Stephen Bush. We need to make sure that we are accepting of people of all backgrounds and I look forward to making progress on this most important of issues.

Those who know the Board of Deputies will understand we work on a diverse set of issues – indeed so much that it is impossible to list everything in a short message.

We exist to ensure that the UK's Jewish community can live freely, happily and continue to practise our traditions.

We are passionate about protecting our religious freedoms, whether the right to circumcise our baby boys in accordance with our tradition or to ensure that employees are able to take time off for Jewish festivals and follow their Jewish traditions within the law.

Our interfaith activities have certainly made the news – for example our support for the Chinese Uyghur Muslims currently suffering oppression in China, has raised awareness of the problems.

Through Pikuach, we supervise religious education in Jewish schools, and pandemic permitting, we travel the country with the Jewish Living Experience exhibition, educating non-Jewish children and adults about our way of life.

We engage with Government ministers, MPs, local councillors, diplomats, faith-leaders and with a huge variety of public bodies on behalf of the community we represent.

We can only do this work with the help of communities across the UK, so I thank you for all the support that you all give. Let's hope the New Year truly does bring health and happiness to all of us.

I thought 1987 was my last year as a volunteer, at that time anyway.

But not to be, I was approached by Sar-El. They wanted me to lead a group of youngsters, mainly university graduates to help with disabled people at a riding school for the disabled in Batsra not far from Jaffa. I said no initially as I do not have the slightest affinity with horses. They kept ringing me and ringing me saying there was no one else they could call on as I had so much experience of the scheme. In the end I gave in. This would be my last time as a volunteer but it was a time to certainly reflect on and remember with great fondness. We were billeted in huge American tents near the stables and we took our first riders out into the paddocks usually around mid-day. So it was very hard and hot work.

One day I had a little girl rider, who was given to me on a very quiet old black horse. It turned out I was told, that the old horse once belonged to the Queen Mother. In the evening



when we had finished with the classes, a meal was brought to us from outside the camp already cooked for us. We had chores to do at the stables; you can guess what I think. Cleaning out the stables, cleaning and washing the horses in the morning. We had a mobile farrier who came round to look after the horses' feet. Fascinating watching him work. I got a chance to drive the tractor round the camp getting hay for the stables. Right up my street that was. One evening we were taken in to Jaffa to the cinema and after I was able to show the young ones round the town, as I knew it quite well. The youngsters weren't too bad, but they knew it all of course!

I will never forget my years as a volunteer in Israel. Such a beautiful country, such hope for the future. I just hope I and the other volunteers helped to take up a bit of the strain for them. It was an honour and a privilege.

VOLUNTEERING FOR THE IDF **(part 2)**



You may remember that in last month's Watchman, I described my final day volunteering in the IDF, and how relieved I was to be able to leave as planned, after losing my army ID card. I may have had more conflicted feelings if I'd have known what lay in store for my unit and the IDF more generally in the near future. I left the army on the 11th June 2014 and flew out of the country on the 12th.

On the same day, Naftali Frenkel, Gilad Shaer and Eyal Yifrah, were kidnapped, by Palestinian terrorists, and a huge operation was launched to find and rescue them, unsuccessfully. After a series of escalations between Israel and Hamas, the IDF invaded the Gaza Strip on 8th July, less than a month after I left the army, and my friends were fighting for their lives in a strange and terrifying war.

I have always felt uncertain about this turn of events (although I know my parents certainly do not!). Obviously, I am glad that I returned to the UK safe from the IDF and was not called upon to either kill or be killed in the defence of the state. However, by the time my friends were risking their lives, I was working in a bar on Newland Avenue. I felt then, as I feel now, that I had let them down by not going through the same risks they did and not playing my part in the war.

I remember finding out that Max Steinberg (z"l), another lone soldier from my Ulpan, who I had seen several times in Tel Aviv, had been killed in

the Battle of Shuja'iyya. I couldn't help but consider the strange twists of fate that led me to a relatively carefree life, drinking and going out with my friends in Hull while Max's parents were burying him on Mount Herzl.



Every year, as the anniversary of my discharge approaches, I take the time to remember Max, as well as reconnect with my friends from the army.

The prospects of a lasting peace appear as distant as ever, and over time my certainty that volunteering was the right thing to do has sadly diminished. What never diminishes, is my admiration and respect for Max, and the countless others who have tragically had to make the same sacrifice in an uncertain and increasingly hostile world.

I am grateful for the protection and strength that Israel gives the Jewish people, and for the certainty that whilst there may always be those who wish harm on the Jews, I am lucky enough to live in a time when there is someone who will fight our corner and do whatever is necessary to protect us.

VOLUNTEERING 1969

Towards the end of the 1960s when I had qualified as a ladies' hairdresser I was working alongside my dear parents in the family business called



'Patricia' on Holderness Road in East Hull. My mother Miriam (Mick) (z'l), had a friend since childhood called Maude Heath who regularly came in for her shampoo and

set. Mrs. Heath later became the Lord Mayor of Kingston upon Hull and was often dropped off by her chauffeur at the saloon (as it was called in those days) without an appointment before some important meeting. Obviously she was never turned away. 3/6p was the price.

Well, one of the Lord Mayor's duties included many charity events and one day when I was attending to Maude's shampoo and set she was telling me that she was setting up a steering committee for a Hospital League of Friends of the Hull Royal Infirmary and would I be interested? If so, there was to be a meeting at the City Hall to see what interest there was. So along I went and the hall was packed. I found myself in the middle somewhere, with the Mayor and her colleagues up on stage. After giving the audience details of what duties would be required etc, I heard her call out "where is Mr Dysch? I think he is interested." Always being shy, small and blushing, I eventually raised my hand to volunteer.

The meetings were always very interesting. Also on the committee was our dear friend, the late Judah Rose (z'l). It was good to have the Jewish connection with the local community. The aim of the League of Friends was to give help to the nurses on the wards, any help wherever it was necessary. My role was to be a lift operator on one of the 4 lifts in the high-rise block at HRI, helping visitors to one of the 13 floors. I felt that life was a bit up and down at this time.

One funny story was about the Prime Minister Edward Heath, who had an altercation with an MP called Angus Maude. Everyone thought it was Maude Heath who was involved. It gave us all a laugh even though it wasn't 'our' Maude.

Although the volunteers were more than happy to be of help it soon became apparent that the scheme was becoming something that wasn't required by the hospital and the League of Friends was turned into a fund- raising effort instead. A lot of money was raised for Hull Royal Infirmary from various events and regular raffle ticket sales.

Eventually I was pleased to look for another area where I could be helpful. I was happy to join the Hillel House committee where Judah was the chairman. I spent 20 years volunteering with the Jewish students who found their way to the University of Hull from their homes around Britain, and some who came from abroad. I continued working for Hillel until Hull Hillel house sadly closed down due to the lack of Jewish students coming to study in Hull.
